IN LOVING MEMORY OF TWO INSPIRING CARMELITES

Earlier this year the Carmelites mourned the deaths of two of our brothers – Fr Ken Petersen and Fr Pat Harney. Widely respected and much-loved, both men served communities with a deep passion and commitment. We pay tribute to them as we reflect on the lives of those they touched.

RECOGNISED AS THE WORLD'S OLDEST CARMELITE



Months shy of his 100th birthday, Fr Pat died with the distinction of being the world's oldest Carmelite on Friday 17 July. He had been a Carmelite for 73 years and a Priest for 68 years.

Born in 1921 in Elmore (Victoria), Pat was the second youngest of eight children. He remembered his home life as filled with daily rosary, morning prayer and Sunday Mass. "Our faith was just part of our lives". This led Fr Pat to decide to become a priest.

"I've been everywhere, man!" he loved to quote when asked about his many places of ministry. Fr Pat served at every Carmelite parish, as Pastor, Prior and Assistant Novice Master in Australia and New Zealand, and as a relieving priest in many country diocesan parishes for priests who were on leave. He also served as Chaplain at Sacred Heart College, Glen Innes, New Zealand and for 16 years as Chaplain at St Vincent's Hospital in Melbourne (Vic).

Fr Pat's journey in life was intrinsically connected to his faith and love of God. "Throughout my life, the hand of God has guided me in a remarkable way and still does." After retiring from active service in 2010, Fr Pat continued to celebrate morning Mass at Our Lady of Mount Carmel Church in Middle Park (Vic) until early this year.

A LIFE DEDICATED TO PEACE AND JUSTICE



Fr Ken had served in the parishes of Coorparoo (QLD), Hilton (WA) and Middle Park (Vic), in formation ministry, as Lay Carmelite National Chaplain and as Prior Provincial. But one of his greatest achievements was Sancta Sophia Meditation Community which he established with Sr Kathleen Murphy OP at Warburton (Vic) in 1996.

Sancta Sophia was founded to promote Inter Religious Dialogue, social justice and human dignity through the practice and teaching of meditation, days of prayer, retreats and spiritual counselling. Both Fr Ken and Sr Kathleen saw Sancta Sophia as a "life-giving community where the stranger would be welcomed."

Throughout his life, Ken rejoiced in and generously shared his experience of God's spirit at work in his own life and helped others recognize it at work in theirs.

Ken died on Saturday 13 June in the same peaceful manner as he had lived his last days, completing a life dedicated to peace and justice. He had been a Carmelite for 58 years and a priest for almost 52 years.

The Carmelites recognise that education empowers people to transform their lives. From the very beginning our goal was to provide financial assistance to teachers working as volunteers in Zumalai and students in Zumalai to attend high school.

EDUCATING YOUNG ADULTS OUT OF POVERTY THROUGH SCHOLARSHIPS

Timorese children and young adults are given scholarships when they meet any one of our three criteria - they are from a family experiencing high-level poverty; they are from a family with no parents or a single parent; or they have a disability.

This year there are 27 young people with a scholarship, including 15 young men and 12 young women. These students are undertaking study at a range of levels with 9 at high school, 2 at vocational training centres and 16 at university.

Elisa dreams of guiding tourists around her beautiful country, showcasing its diverse environment, rich heritage and cultural landmarks.



"I really like learning languages and being able to communicate with people from around the world. I love my country and I want to show it to visitors so they can experience how wonderful all the places are here."

For many young adults like Elisa, being able to stay in school can be nothing more than just a dream. With Timor-Leste being the poorest country in our region, poverty and the lack of a stable income can put an end to pursuing an education. When Elisa was very young her mother died. Soon after, her father moved to Indonesia leaving her to be raised by her grandparents, aunt and uncle.

The generous support of the Carmelite family has provided Elisa with an invaluable scholarship.

Today Elisa is in her third year of a five-year Tourism and Travel Management Course at Dili Institute of Technology.

"My favourite subject is Tourism Geography because we study about the municipalities, culture, and the environment. We look at which places are good to visit, the natural places that are beautiful like waterfalls. This subject is about our own country."

Receiving an annual scholarship is helping Elisa realise her dreams of becoming a tourist guide and showcasing the natural beauty of Timor-Leste to an international audience.

"I'm so grateful that I can study and have all these experiences. When I was in high school, I didn't know what I would do next, but now the Carmelites are supporting me and so I'm working hard for my future and for my countries future."

Matthew ordained deacon



On Saturday 26 September, Matthew was ordained deacon by Archbishop Mark Coleridge in Our Lady of Mount Carmel Church, Coorparoo (QLD). While Matthew's parents were unable to attend, his aunt

and uncle were present and vested Matthew in his diaconal robes.

Fr Donato ordained

Early August saw Fr Donato ordained as priest at St James Church in Hera. The ceremony and feast afterwards were attended by over 1,000 people. The Archbishop of Dili was the celebrant while Fr Carlito represented the Provincial. For the past year Donato was a member of our community at Coorparoo (QLD). He is now serving as an Assistant Priest in the parish of Zumalai.

Newest Aussie Carmelite

On 17 June Fr Paul Sireh became an Australian Citizen. Originally from Manus Island, Paul joined the Carmelites in 2000. Since his ordination in 2005, Paul has served in the Carmelite parishes of Wentworthville (NSW) and Coorparoo (QLD) before taking up his present ministry as Chaplain at Whitefriars College, Donvale (VIC).

Lastly congratulations to Fr Bruce Clark who celebrated 40 years since his first profession and Frs Aniceto and Nelinho's who celebrated their 25th anniversaries. The Archbishop of Dili was the principal celebrant at the Mass in Hera. More than 2,000 people attended the celebration.

HELPING OUR NEIGHBOURS DURING COVID-19

At the height of the global pandemic lockdown, the Carmelites were providing practical support to keep communities safe and prepare schools to reopen.

During government lockdown, many Timorese found themselves unable to provide for their families. Over 40 families received vital food parcels, containing staples such as rice, noodles, cooking oil and other daily essentials from the Carmelites in Hera and Fatuhada.

Carmelite Boarding School students, Genivio, Elias, Celiano and Ricardo, along with Br Antonio, were busily sewing face masks to distribute to neighbours, the Police Force and anyone who needed one in Zumalai, Timor-Leste.



So our schools could reopen, Br Antonio set up additional handwashing stations at the school in Zumalai, along with buying bins, taps and soap for the schools in Raimea and Beco. Together with the few Boarding House students unable to go back to their homes, Br Antonio helped disinfect the House so it was safe for all Boarding House students to return.

SUPPORTING OUR TIMORESE STUDENTS FROM AFAR

Educating young men to become Carmelites and helping young adults continue with their education is possible because of the generosity of people from all over the world. This includes the United States of America, where two philanthropic organisations showed their generous support of our education programs.

In March, the **Koch Foundation** granted US\$10,000 to support the Carmelite students in Timor-Leste. This is the third consecutive year in which we have been awarded a grant by the Koch Foundation which is a wonderful testimony to the great work of our program. Our students will continue to fulfil their core mission of serving in the midst of the people and to help their communities grow in their Catholic Faith.

The Justice, Peace and Integrity of Creation Commission of the U.S. Carmelite province of the Most Pure Heart of Mary (Chicago) gave two grants totalling US\$20,000. One grant will support our scholarship program in Timor. This is the first time we have received a grant in support of this invaluable program. The second grant will help teachers at the Zumalai schools be trained in the Carmelites' Safeguarding Policy.
