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CELEBRATING AT HOME HOLY THURSDAY

Washing feet, sharing bread and wine: Love poured out in service

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Perhaps the best time for this liturgy is as you gather for your evening meal around the dining room table. You could light a candle as a reminder that being at table with each other is a sacred time. You can decide which parts to use before you eat and which to use afterwards. You could share a sign of peace with each other at the end of the meal.

Sign of the Cross

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. **Amen**

The Lord is here, present among us. We are gathered with the whole Church in this moment of prayer.

Remembering

We remember that on this night the Lord Jesus shared a final meal with his friends before his passion, death and resurrection.

We remember that during that meal he washed the feet of his friends, broke bread and shared wine.

He commanded us to do all this in his memory.

Blessing the Meal

May your blessing, Lord, be on us, on our family, and friends, on those who grew, provided and prepared this food.

May we be truly grateful for all that we receive from your goodness. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Scripture Reading (ICor II:23-26)

This is what I received from the Lord, and in turn passed on to you: that on the same night he was betrayed, the Lord Jesus took some bread, and thanked God for it and broke it, and he said: 'This is my body, which is for you; do this as a memorial of me.' In the same way he took the cup after supper, and said, 'This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Whenever you drink it, do this as a memorial of me.' Until the Lord comes, therefore, every time you eat this bread and drink this cup, you are proclaiming his death.

Reflection

On this night we recall Jesus' commandment to love one another, his washing of the disciples' feet and the breaking of the bread of his own life, not just at table, but also on the altar of the Cross, for the healing and nourishment of the world.

The liturgy on Holy Thursday is a meditation on the essential connection between the Eucharist and Christian love expressed in serving one another. Christ is not only present in the Eucharist but also in the deeds of loving kindness offered to others through us.

We are the ones who make 'real' the presence of Jesus in every smile, kind word and loving action.

Lord's Prayer

Jesus himself taught us how to pray, so with confidence we say:

Our father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.

Closing Prayer

May your blessing be upon us, O Lord. Keep us strong in our love for you and for one another, through Christ our Lord. **Amen**
